### WPCC 2019 COMMUNITY ASSESSMENT REPORT



This 19-page report, in mailboxes January 8th, will be discussed at the Waite Park Community Council (WPCC) Annual Meeting on Wednesday, February 5, --

In the summer of 2019, WPCC conducted an on-line community survey with 221 responses and a six- person doorknocking campaign with 150 responses to learn from residents about their wishes and concerns for the neighborhood, as well as their feedback about WPCC's efforts.

The community council's goal was to find out what kind of neighborhood our neighbors want to build together so that wecan develop and/ or support programs and services to support our neighbors' vision.

WPCC contracted with Scott Chazdon and Ella Weber, evaluation consultants' to analyze the assessment data and write this report.

Community Participation Program (CPP) funds from the City of Minneapolis paid the costs of this report.

Waite Park neighborhood has around \$230,000 available in Neighborhood Revitalization Program (NRP) and Community Participation Program (CPP) funds. Approximately \$110,000 of the available NRP funds must be used for housing and housing-related programs.

WPCC's robust needs assessment community engagement process kicked off at last year's annual meeting.

### Stormwater Management in Basements & Yards: First Ward City Council Member Kevin Reich WPCC Board Meeting 7 p.m. Thurs, Feb. 27

Did you experience more moisture/wetness in your homes and/or yards in 2019? 2019 marked Minneapolis' wettest water year on record, and the extra 10 + inches of precipitation saturated our ground with moisture. Experts have published multiple reports that we can expect a wetter future in Minnesota which means this issue will continue to persist and could worsen. During the next century, spring rainfall and annual precipitation are likely to increase, and severe rainstorms are likely to intensify. Each of these factors will tend to further increase the risk of flooding.

Wetter futures won't only have an impact on our homes and places of business, more precipitation increases the chances of: more pollution through run off to our storm drains; harming the quality of water in our lakes and rivers; increased erosion to alleys and sidewalks; and wetter, spongier yards. Naturally, these issues will carry increased costs for residents and for the city.

We are interested in hearing from you about any significant water-related events you experienced in 2019: any damages you experienced, how often, and how you mitigated these issues.

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### Neighborhoods 2020 Update

Last September, the City of Minneapolis contracted with the University of Minnesota's Center for Urban and Regional Affairs (CURA) to assist the City's Neighborhood and Community Relations (NCR) Department with the final phase of Neighborhoods 2020. Neighborhoods 2020 will identify the next generation of neighborhood funding, programming and governance structure needed to better support community and neighborhood organizations in the future.

CURA convened meetings with BIPOC (Black, Indigenous and People of Color) residents and neighborhood organization members on the importance of neighborhood work, its funding and other topics impacting Neighborhoods 2020. CURA held a series of three neighborhood stakeholder meetings beginning in November. The December series for neighborhood stakeholders was "Visioning, commitments and accountability" and the January series was "Report back: Wrestling and creating a model for future resolution".

You can get all the latest information on Neighborhoods 2020 before the draft guidelines go out for a 45-day public comment period at a morning break-out session at the Community Connections Conference on February 1. The "Comment on Neighborhoods 2020" session is presented by CURA and NCR: "This workshop will focus on learning about the Racial Equity Analysis for neighborhood programming completed by CURA and its funding implications for the next generation of neighborhood programing. Data about NRP Phase I and II and the Community Participation Program will be presented. Participants will also discuss draft program guidelines to create a racial equity focus for the next program

Draft Program Guidelines will to be released for a 45-day public comment period in February, shortly after the morning breakout session at the Community Connections Conference. Then, the draft would go before the City Council's Public Health, Environment, Civil Rights and Engagement Committee in late March and would go before the full City Council in early April.



### **Elections & Voter Services New Facility**

Elections & Voter Services has moved from City Hall to 980 E Hennepin Ave. Why did you move?

The move brings all elections operations together under one roof for the first time. Early voting, warehouse, mail ballot processing, candidate filing, election judge training, and administration are all in the new building. We're thrilled to have all staff located together to better coordinate our services. What are the parking and transit options?

The building is located just off I-35W on East Hennepin Ave. Nearby bus routes include the 61, 25, and 4. The building has free public parking, and bike racks are available in front of our entrance. A Nice Ride hub is located nearby as well.

### Can I still vote early downtown?

Yes. In addition to the new site (roughly 2 milesfrom City Hall), you can vote early at the downtown Hennepin County Government Center. There are plans to open additional early voting sites around the city for general elections.

### 2020 Election Calendar

In 2020, Minneapolis residents will vote for President, Vice President, US Representative, State Senator, State Representative, Judicial seats, and School Board (even districts and one at-large).

### **Precinct Caucuses - see page 4**

Precinct caucuses are organized by Minnesota's political parties to establish policy positions and other party business. The presidential primary on March 3 replaces the presidential straw poll that used to be held during the precinct caucus. More information about caucus activities can be obtained from the political party of your choosing, or via the MN Secretary of State's Office. Minneapolis Elections & Voter Services, a non-partisan administrator of elections, is not involved in the caucus process.

\* If you miss the pre-registration deadline, you can still register and vote at the polls on Election Day. See Election Day registration details for the required proofs of address and identity. Pre-registering saves time and the need to bring any additional documents to the polls.

### **Precinct Caucuses**

Precinct caucuses will be held February 25, 2020, one week before the Presidential Nomination Primary.

Never been to a caucus? Not sure how it works? Learn more about the process below! We encourage Minnesotans to show support for their preferred candidates by participating in the candidate endorsement process that leads up to the state party conventions.

It all begins on Tuesday, February 25, 2020 with the precinct caucuses. Going to caucus is a great way to show support for a candidate, raise an issue that's important to you, influence who the party will endorse for many offices, and meet people in your community.

#### When and where will 2020 precinct caucuses be held?

The 2020 precinct caucuses will be held on Tuesday, February 25 at 7:00 p.m. at locations set by the parties.

#### What is a precinct caucus?

Precinct caucuses are meetings run by Minnesota's political parties. They are the first in a series of meetings where parties may endorse candidates, select delegates, and set goals and values (called party platforms).

### Who can participate in a caucus?

To participate, you must be eligible to vote in the November 2020 general election and live in the precinct. You also must generally agree with the principles of the political party hosting the caucus.

### What happens at the caucus?

Each political party runs their caucus meetings a little differently. Check with your political party if you have specific questions. Generally, there are three main activities at a caucus:

- 1. Choose volunteers who will organize political activities in the precinct. This could include maintaining contact lists, holding political meetings, and helping with campaign efforts.
- 2. Discuss issues and ideas for the party to support. You can present an issue or idea for the party to support, called a resolution. If you convince other attendees to support your resolution, it will be taken to the next political convention. Eventually, your resolution could become part of the official party platform.
- 3. Choose delegates who will endorse candidates at future conventions. At future conventions, party delegates will endorse state and federal, including for Governor. Political parties have different ways of choosing delegates at the precinct level caucus—contact your party for more information.

If you have questions, concerns or a complaint about your precinct caucus, please contact the political party holding the caucus meeting. Unlike elections, which are run by local and state government election officials, precinct caucuses are run by political parties. Everything from site location to how the caucus is conducted is the responsibility of the party.

### Right to time off work to attend caucuses

You have the right to take time off work to be at a precinct caucus or political party convention (if you're a delegate or alternate). You must give your employer ten days' written notice (See 202A.19, subd.2 and 202A.135).

### Accessibility at caucuses

Major political parties must attempt to provide you an interpreter by request, if you are deaf, deafblind, or hard-of-hearing. If you are visually impaired, you also have the right to get written caucus materials ahead of time, by request (see 202A.155).

No Minnesota state college or university may schedule an event which will take place after 6:00 p.m. unless permission to do so has been received from the Board of Trustees of the Minnesota State Colleges and Universities.

### **Presidential primary**

In 2016 legislation was passed establishing a presidential nomination primary. The current election law specific to the presidential primary is in Minnesota Statutes Chapter 207A and Rules Chapter 8215. Common questions about the presidential primary are answered below.

When will the presidential nomination primary take place? March 3, 2020.

### Will all parties participate in the presidential nomination primary?

No, only major parties will participate. Two major parties, the Democratic-Farmer-Labor Party and the Republican Party, have submitted candidates for the ballot. Two other parties, the Grassroots-Legalize Cannabis Party and the Legal Marijuana Now Party, have notified this office that they will not be participating.

### Will all parties be on the same ballot?

No, each participating major party will have a separate ballot.

### Who decides which candidates will appear on a party's ballot?

The chair of each party will submit a list of candidates for the party's ballot no later than 63 days before the date of the presidential primary (December 31, 2019). The Republican candidate list was filed 10/25/19, and the Democratic-Farmer-Labor candidate list was filed 12/17/19.

### What if a candidate drops out before the primary?

Once a party's list is submitted, changes will not be made to candidates that will appear on the ballot.

### Will there be a place to write in a choice or vote for "uncommitted"?

Only if it is requested by the party chair. Party chairs will need to submit names of write-in candidates to be counted seven days before the primary.

### Will any other offices be on the ballot?

No, only presidential candidates from a major party will appear on the presidential primary ballot. Other offices with a primary will be on the primary ballot in August.

### How will I be able to vote in the presidential nomination primary?

Registered voters will be able to vote at their polling place on presidential primary day or by absentee ballot in the 46 days before presidential primary day (starting January 17, 2020). A voter must request the ballot of the party of their choice. If a refuses to select a party, they will not be able to vote in the **presidential nomination primary.** 

### Will other people know which party's ballot I request?

A voter's choice of party ballot will be recorded and is private data. However, a list of who voted in a presidential nomination primary and the political party each voter selected will be provided to the chair of each major political party. How a voter voted on the ballot will be secret.

### Will parties have to abide by the primary results?

The presidential primary results must bind the election of delegates in each party.

#### Who will pay for the presidential nomination primary?

County and municipalities will be reimbursed by the state for the primary costs.

### How much will the primary cost?

The Office of Secretary of State surveyed all 87 Minnesota Counties and, based on that survey, estimates that the cost to administer the Presidential Nomination Primary will be \$11.9 million. The Secretary of State has certified this estimate to the Commissioner of Management and Budget. Counties and municipalities will be reimbursed for their costs of administering the Presidential Nomination Primary following the election.

### Will there still be precinct caucuses?

Yes, precinct caucuses and local and state nominating conventions will still take place to conduct other party business.
