As you know, 2020 is critical in terms of representation for our community membersand the allocation of federal funds. Casey Carl and David Rubedor intend to meet with every neighborhood organization in Minneapolis to talk about some important upcoming dates and share some ideas about how neighborhoods could help to reach traditionally underrepresented communities.

Nine days after the special District 60A primary, this meeting kicks off a very busy week: Community Connections Conference on Saturday, [Super Bowl Sunday], Special House District 60A election on Tuesday, and WPCC's Annual Meeting on Wednesday.

Then precinct caucuses Februay 25, one week before the Presidential Nomination Primary. And Census Day is April 1. We Count!

This meeting will start at 7 p.m. and end at 8:30.

Waite Park Block Club Rebate and Safety & Security Rebate End on Dec. 31, 2019

As reported in the June/July Waite Park Voice, the Waite Park Community Council's (WPCC) Block Club Rebate Program and Safety and Security Rebate Program will expire at the end of 2019. Original receipts must bedated by December 31, 2019; application forms will be accepted until January 31, 2020 unless the funds run out.

These two rebate programs are funded by Waite Park Neighborhood's NRP (Neighborhood Revitalization Program). The WPCC's robust year long robust community assessment process will and priority planning process will determine where to spend theCity funds in the future, including whetheror not funds will be allocated to these programs after the end of 2019. The Community Assessment Report will be discussed at the WPCC Annual Meeting on Wednesday, February 5th, 2020; social hour at 6 p.m, meeting at 7 p.m. Childcare provided. More on this process and meeting in the next newsletter, which will bein mailboxes at least ten days before the meeting.

Block Club \$ 100 Rebates



The \$100 Block Club Rebate Program provides a rebate to organized block clubs within the Waite Park Neighborhood. Waite Park residents who organize a block club event, National Night Out event or gathering during the year to meet with neighbors are eligible.

Recipients can be part of a current block club recognized by the Minneapolis Police Department Second Precinct or a block club that hosts at least one gathering year to which all block residents are invited, as verified by 2 residents,.

Please see our website, www.waiteparkmpls.org, or park literature rack for the form. Simply print out and complete the application form below and send it in with the original receipt(s) from the item(s) you purchased.

No food or beverage expenses are eligible. Educational programming expense is eligible. Rebates are for supplies and products only; reimbursement for labor. Multiple applications may be submitted, but the total of rebates for any block club is limited to \$100 per block club for 2019. For a list of eligible improvements and the rebateform, please see our website or park literature rack or the form.

Safety & Security \$100 Rebates



The Waite Park Community Council is offering \$100 rebates to all Waite Park residents that purchase eligible basic security or safety related items by the end of 2019. All properties in the Waite Park Neighborhood, both residential and commercial, may receive a rebate without regard to participation in previous years.

Examples of eligible improvements include smoke detectors, carbon monoxide (CO) detectors, radon testing kits or associated test fees, fire extinguishers, exterior security/motion lighting fixtures including any necessarywiring and electrical work, and exterior steel security doors, including garage access doors. Please see the application form for more examples.

The following are NOT eligible: tools, rental charges, personal installation time or "sweat equity", security system monthly monitoring or service fees [initial installation of home security system/service is eligible but not the monthly monitoring or servicing fees], storm or combination doors not of the all-steel "security" type (even if lockable), and batteries, light bulbs or other consumables.

The application form is available in the Waite Park literature rack, 1810 34th Avenue Northeast, and on our new website, www.waiteparkmpls.org. Send the original receipt(s) from the item(s) you purchased with the form. Multiple applications may be submitted, but the total of rebates for any property is limited to \$100 per property in 2019. Rebates are available unless the funds run out.

Special Election for House District 60A Primary Election Tuesday, January 21 Special Election Tuesday, February 4

There will be a Special Election to fill a vacancy in Minnesota House District 60, which includes parts of Northeast Minneapolis, including Waite Park Neighborhood.

The vacancy was caused by the passing of Representative Diane Loeffler on November 16.

The Primary election will be held from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. on Tuesday, January 21. The General election will be held from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m on Tuesday, February 4.

Vote Early

Don't want to wait in line on election day? Vote early! All voters in Minnesota can choose to vote before Election Day by absentee ballot without providing a reason.

You can vote by mail, or you can vote early in-person.

Voters can vote at the Minneapolis Elections & Voter Services main office, which recently moved to the Eastside, at 980 East Hennepin Avenue.



We Count: The Community Connections Conference is Saturday, February 1, 2020

On Saturday, February 1, 2020, from 8 a.m.-4 p.m., the City of Minneapolis will hold its annual Community Connections Conference at the Minneapolis Convention Center. The 2020 conference theme is "We count." Registration will open by January, 2020. In 2019, 885 people attended.

Conference theme and objectives

By using the theme "We count," the City is saying that all communities are welcome and valued in Minneapolis and calling on communities to get involved in decision-making in 2020. Residents can get involved by committing to get counted in the census, vote, join an advisory committee or neighborhood board [Waite Park Community Council!] learn about important local issues and City policies or volunteer with a community organization. The City hosts this conference so that:

- Residents, community groups, neighborhood organizations, City of Minneapolis departments and decision-makers collaborate and connect with each other to address community issues.
- All communities feel welcome to interact with or get involved in local decision-making.
- Residents learn about programs and policies that affect them.

The City is seeking ideas for breakout sessions and exhibitors on topics that align with the conference objectives and theme for this year. You can submit your breakout session idea at the conference website:

Neighborhoods 2020 Update

This September, the City of Minneapolis contracted with the University of Minnesota's Center for Urban and Regional Affairs (CURA) for the final phase of Neighborhoods 2020. Read the full list of CURA's contract deliverables here.

On Nov. 18, CURA convened an initial dialogue with BIPOC (Black, Indigenous and People of Color) residents and neighborhood organization members on the importance of neighborhood work, its funding and other topics impacting Neighborhoods 2020. CURA followed this dialogue on Nov. 21 with the first of a series of neighborhood stakeholder meetings. About 60 people participated in this robust discussion.

The next two meetings scheduled for neighborhood stakeholders are:

- Dec. 17, from 6-8 p.m. At POlymouth Congregapional Church, 1900 Avenue South, Visioning, commitments and accountability.
- Jan. 9, from 6-8 p.m.
 Report back: Wrestling and creating a model for future resolution.

The materials created from this process are expected to be released for a 45-day public comment in January or February of 2020. Then, these materials would go before the City Council's Public Health, Environment, Civil Rights and Engagement Committee in late March and would go before the full City Council in early April.



Applications for 2020 appointments due Weds, Dec. 18

The Minneapolis Park and Recreation Board (MPRB) Board of Commissioners is seeking applications for appointments to eight ongoing community advisory committees:

- . St. Anthony Falls Heritage Board (1 appointee) to begin serving January 2, 2020
- Minneapolis Tree Advisory Committee (5 appointees) to begin serving January 2
- · Racial Equity Community Advisory Committee (1 appointee) to begin serving immediately. The appointee may continue serving for a 2-year term commencing July 1, 2020, if interested.
- · Glyphosate Technical Advisory Committee (3 appointees) to begin serving immediately, the term will end Nov. 30, 2020
- Neighborhood & Community Engagement Cmte. (1 appointee) to begin serving July 1.
- HomeGrown (one appointee) to begin serving on January 2.
- Minneapolis Bicycle Advisory Committee (3 appointees) to begin serving on July 1.
- Pedestrian Advisory Committee (1 appointee) to begin serving July 1.

Service commitment may vary based upon needs, expectations and policy goals. However, most advisory committee members can expect to approximately 10-15 hours of work per month. Most terms are two years and all board and commission members are not subject to term limits.

Some Boards/Commissions have a need for specialized skills, but most people will find a Board or Commission that is a great fit for their knowledge base. Public members of Board and Commissions are people who may not have regular, ongoing experience in a specific topic area, but have a general interest in a Board or Commission's work area. This is a wonderful opportunity to learn more about an area of interest and contribute a perspective that is fresh and unique to the service area.

Applications must be received no later than 4 p.m., Wednesday, December 18, 2019.

Following submission, applicants will receive an email confirming receipt of the application and describing the general process for appointment. Appointments for open positions will be made at the January 2, 2020 MPRB annual meeting. Lawns to Legumes Program now Accepting Applications

The Minnesota Board of Water and Soil Resources (BWSR) is now accepting applications for the Lawns to Legumes program, which aims to increase residential habitat for at-risk pollinators across the state. Lawns to Legumes offers a combination of workshops, coaching, planting guides and funding for installing pollinator-friendly native plantings in residential lawns.

Minnesota residents can now apply to be reimbursed for up to \$350 in costs associated with establishing pollinator habitats in their yards. Applications will be accepted through February 28. Applicants who qualify for reimbursement are expected to attend a workshop or webinar to better ensure project success. Funding decisions and all notifications will be emailed in March for Spring 2020 installations. How to apply: Apply online at Blue Thumb's website, www.bluethumb.org. **Am I eligible?**

Anyone is welcome to use the planting guide or attend a workshop developed for this program to help plan a pollinator habitat project. Note: if you are reading a hard copy of the Voice, go to the website, www.waiteparkmpls.org and click on "Resources" and then click on "Lawns to Legumes Program" for these two blue links and the four blue links at end of this article.

Minnesota residents anywhere in the state who have an area at their home that can be used for outdoor planting can apply for a combination of technical assistance (workshops, coaching) and cost-share funding. Proximity to areas where the Rusty patched bumblebee is likely to be present will be one factor considered when awarding reimbursement grants.

What does this program do?

Lawns to Legumes offers workshops, coaching, planting guides and cost-share funding for installing pollinator-friendly native plantings in residential lawns. The program also includes a public education campaign to raise awareness for pollinator habitat projects and will establish demonstration neighborhoods that showcase best practices.

Why does this matter?

Minnesota is home to more than 450 native bee species. Pollinators also include butterflies, moths, beetles and native flies. All play a key role in pollinating many food crops and native plants, but populations have significantly declined worldwide in recent years. Population decline can be attributed to habitat loss and lack of related nutrition for pollinators, as well as pesticide use and pathogens.

The program aims to protect the federally endangered state bee, the Rusty patched bumblebee, and other at-risk pollinators. Even relatively small plantings of native flowers can help create conditions that are valuable to pollinators and can help build important habitat corridors.



It's a great incentive to finish up the last few little projects," Ashmore said. "It's particularly attractive for homeowners and visitors when there are two or more homes close together on tour, so use your winter gatherings to encourage a cluster of homes and folks to help hold them open."

Contractors and other vendors may nominate and appear at homes they have worked on. Energy efficient and historically-sensitive remodels get special notice among the approximately 50 homes. It is not necessary to have remodeled the whole house.

The tour is a celebration of city living that encourages homeowners to improve existing homes, and to complement the neighborhood flavor if they build new. 
