

North Columbia Golf Course Stormwater Water **Management Project**

Presentation by Marcy Bean from MWMO, and staff from Public Works and the Park Board. This project will install best management practices to capture and treat stormwater runoff in and around the Columbia Golf Course. The project will:

- Increase golf course playability and park use. (No changes to number of golf course holes.)
- Reduce flooding in golf course and surrounding neighborhoods.
- Reduce pollutants entering into the Mississippi.
- Improve habitat and ecology of the park and golf course.

Possible Home Improvement Program

Jim Hasnik, Center for Energy and Environment (CEE) will talk about re-establishing an NRP (Neighborhood Revitalization Program) Home Improvement Program for Waite Park Neighborhood: options, what seems to be working in other neighborhoods, and so on.

Under NRP Phase II policy and state law governing the use of NRP funds, approximately \$110,000 of Waite Park's available Phase II funding, \$175, 674.47, must be used for housing and housing-related programs.

Waite Park's Home Improvement Loan Program and Emergency Loan Program ended two years ago when the Greater Minneapolis Housing Corporation decided to shut down its Housing Resource Center program.

Possible Raingarden Program in 2020

Waite Park NRP funds have been used to pay part of the costs of raingardens in the neighborhood since 2017, and Metro Blooms would like to know if there will a program in

I'm Michelle Shaw, and I've been on your board since 2018. To be honest, other than the safety rebates, I didn't really know we had much in terms of a neighborhood association up until going to the annual meeting that winter. I'm hoping that will be a part of my second career at this late stage of my life. Being active with the fight to stop Line 3 in northern Minnesota; advocating for plant-rich diets because of their positive impacts on our health, our planet, and all living beings; and also advocating for communities of color, Indigenous and low-income communities to be included in conversations that impact them at all levels of city planning before decisions are made...These are all essential volunteer positions to hold, and they have given me a renewed sense of purpose that I didn't have my first few years of being on disability.

Most importantly, family is precious to me. I'm a mom to two furry kids whom you may hear barking when you pass by our house: Buddie and Speckles. I have two awesome nephews who are growing up way too fast, and I love the time I get to spend with my parents.

Please let me know if you have any concerns regarding the environment since I'm our ward's representative on the Community Environmental Advisory Commission, and I'm also on the Park Board's Upper Harbor Terminal Community Advisory Commission. You are welcome to come to both of these meetings any time, so just let me know if you have any questions.

Yard Waste Collection



Yard waste collection will end the week of November 18 - 22, 2019. You may place properly prepared yard waste out for collection on your regularly scheduled collection day.

The following are accepted:

- YW Reusable Container
- Paper lawn and leaf bags
- BPI certified compostable plastic bags
- Reusable container must be 32-38 gallons in size, 26-32 inches tall, have sturdy handles, and weigh no more than 40 pounds when full.

Brush and branches bundled with string or twine. Bundles must be less than 3 feet long and weigh less than 40 pounds. Branches must be less than 3 inches in diameter.

Why Rake Your Leaves?

Instead of spending hours raking and bagging the leaves in your yard, why not be lazy and utilize your leaves in a number of easy ways!

Just mow your leaves when they are dry and they will crumble into nutrients for your lawn and improve the structure of your soil.

In the Waite Park Community Garden two truckloads of leaves are brought in every autumn by a fellow gardener so that other garden members may intergrade the leaves into their plots for nutrients. Also, the leaves are shoveled and turned into the compost bins at a ratio of 1 part brown (leaves) to 2 parts green (vegetation).

Leaves also have an insulation property; cover your roses and young perennials with them so that they have a better chance to survive through our harsh Minnesota winters.

In the spring, if any leaves remain in the community garden we often use them as a weed block. Layering leaves around seedlings is an organic and efficient way to fend off weeds and to retain moisture in the soil throughout the entire growing season.

This is the advice that has been given to me by many master gardeners and has proven to work so perhaps you'll give these ideas a try.

Vision Zero Initiative Update & Public Comment Period

The City of Minneapolis has released a draft of the Minneapolis Vision Zero Action Plan, which outlines key steps for the next three years to advance the City's goal of ending traffic deaths and injuries on City streets by 2027. **The City is taking public comment on the plan through Oct. 16.**

The draft plan was developed by City staff from multiple departments with significant direction from community stakeholders, partner agencies and the public. The City of Minneapolis officially became a Vision Zero city in September 2017 when the City Council passed a resolution setting a goal of eliminating traffic deaths and injuries within 10 years. Minneapolis is one of more than 35 Vision Zero cities in the United States.

The draft Vision Zero Action Plan includes 16 strategies and 68 actions to be implemented between 2020 and 2022.

Highlights of proposed strategies include:

- **Reduce speed limits**. Slower speeds on our streets make travel safer for everyone no matter how they get around. Minnesota cities recently received authority to control speed limits on City-owned streets and the City is taking appropriate steps to lower speed limits on most City streets.
- Make safety improvements on High Injury Streets. Seventy percent of severe and fatal crashes happen on just 9% of streets in Minneapolis. The City and partners will proactively install traffic safety treatments on High Injury Streets. These treatments will include four-to-three lane safety conversions, pedestrian medians, bump outs, and other street safety best practices.
- Address leading unsafe traffic behaviors. The five traffic behaviors that lead to
 the most severe and fatal crashes in Minneapolis are driving under the influence of
 alcohol or drugs, distracted driving, speeding, red light running and unsafe turning.
 The City will address these unsafe behaviors head-on through a combination of
 education, communications, and enforcement actions.
- Seek to implement automated traffic enforcement. Automated traffic enforcement has proven effective at saving lives and it eliminates the need for officer interaction. The City will seek legislative authority to implement camera enforcement while studying and engaging on the details to implement it effectively and equitably.

Fall Street Sweep

Minneapolis Public Works will begin the big task of curb-to-curb sweeping and leaf collection on streets throughout the city on Tuesday, Oct. 22. During the four weeks of the comprehensive fall street sweep, crews will clean about 1,000 miles of city streets Tomake sure crews can do the best job possible, temporary "No Parking" signs will be posted at least 24 hours in advance so streets will be clear of cars when they're swept. The first signs will be posted Monday, Oct. 21, and sweeping will begin the next day. Anyone who parks on the street will need to follow posted parking rules or their cars may be ticketed and towed.

Here are just some of the ways to stay informed of the parking rules:

"No Parking" signs – City crews will post "No Parking" signs at least 24 hours before sweeping any streets. Parking will be banned from 7 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. on the day a street is swept. Once the "No Parking" signs are removed, people can resume parking.

Social media – The City will use Facebook and Twitter to post periodic street sweeping updates and information.

Phone calls to residents – In addition to the "No Parking" signs that will be posted the day before sweepers come through, the City will make about 3,000 automated phone calls each evening to let residents know their street will be swept the next day.

Interactive web feature – Folks can use a feature on the City's website to find out when the sweepers are coming through their neighborhoods. The Street Sweeping Schedule Lookup will be available at www.minneapolismn.gov/streetsweeping once we get closer to the start date. The fall street sweep takes four weeks, and visitors to the website will be able to find out which week their street is scheduled to be swept. Then, on the weekend before each of the four weeks, the schedule for the upcoming week will be broken down to show which day of the week streets are scheduled to be swept.

Waite Park NRP Update & Possible Home Improvement Program

Therefore, Waite Park Community Council (WPCC) is carrying out a robust community engagement process during 2019 to review how neighborhood funding has been used to date, where available funding is still available, and how that funding can best be used for both ongoing and new neighborhood priorities.

Waite Park neighborhood still has funding available under the following:


NRP Phase I plan \$14,909.59 NRP Phase II plan* \$175,674.47 CPP program and priorities \$53,131.24 Total available* \$243,715.30

Note* - Under NRP Phase II policy and state law governing the use of NRP funds, approximately \$110,000 of this available funding must be used for housing and housing-related programs.

2020 Budget Letter from Mayor Frey

On August 15, the mayor presented his proposed budget for 2020 at his yearly budget address. In his budget, he outlines a path forward for funding of the Neighborhood and Community Relations (NCR) Department, Waite Park Community Council and neighborhood organizations.

Dear neighborhood and community leaders:

On August 15, I shared my 2020 Budget priorities with the public and City Council. Our proposed 2020 budget includes funding for several tailored strategies for economic inclusion, affordable housing, and police-community relations.

Our budget proposal also includes an array of measures to protect the city's financial security in the years ahead – a number of which will be relevant for those who work with our city's neighborhood organizations. The state-created consolidated Tax Increment Finance district – which has funded neighborhood associations and NCR for years – is set to expire in 2020. That would leave a big hole in the City's budget of over 7 million dollars in 2021. It would have been easy to kick the can down the road. But I felt strongly that we could not leave our neighborhoods and an entire City department in limbo.

Instead, we have laid out a proactive plan to provide funding for this work and an opportunity for Council Members to make the best decisions for the future, freed from the looming question of whether any funding is available. In other words, we are ensuring that even with the elimination of TIF funding, NCR and neighborhood organizations are funded at current service levels from the general fund. With the issue of funding resolved in the short term, we can now shape both NCR and neighborhood funding in the best way possible for our city.

You should also feel free to share your opinion and experience with your Council Member or at any of the upcoming budget hearings taking place through the end of the year.

Minneapolis selects CURA for final phase of Neighborhoods 2020. Future programming to address equity.

The City of Minneapolis has engaged the University of Minnesota's Center for Urban and Regional Affairs (CURA) for the final phase of Neighborhoods 2020. CURA has several decades of experience working with many neighborhood organizations to create strategic initiatives, planning and board development.



It also works to benefit historically marginalized communities. CURA will help the Neighborhood and Community Relations Department with these elements of the final phase of Neighborhoods 2020:

- Developing overall program goals and outcomes.
- Developing metrics to measure progress toward goals.
- Developing the Neighborhoods 2020 program guidelines.
- Defining a racial equity analysis of neighborhood association operations and activities.
- Developing a "logic model" for the new neighborhoods program that includes inputs, activities, outputs and outcomes.
- Convening the governance and funding workgroups and include additional stakeholders such as Neighborhood Revitalization Program Policy Board members, Neighborhood and Community Engagement Commission commissioners and neighborhood association members.
- Emphasizing renters and community members who are not currently engaged in neighborhood associations.
- Identifying a budget-neutral structure for the City to best support neighborhood associations.
- Developing accountability measures for exclusionary practices.

Next steps

In the fall of 2019, the Neighborhood and Community Relations Department and CURA will hold meetings for various stakeholders including neighborhood organizations and black and indigenous communities and communities of color to further develop program guidelines, a racial equity analysis and a "logic model" for the new program. These materials will be posted for a 45-day public comment period in late January 2020. The final draft will go to the City Council's Public Health, Environment, Civil Rights and Engagement Committee in late March with final approval by the City Council in late March or early April 2020. Public School Safety and Protection 2nd Precinct Advisory Council (2-PAC) Meeting 6 p.m. Monday, October 14 Monroe Village Apartments Community Room, 1900 Central Ave.

Active shooters make the news almost weekly. We'll hear from the man whose job is to keep kids safe in their schools: Jason Matlock, Director of Emergency Management, Safety and Security for the Minneapolis Public Schools.

The 2nd Precinct Advisory Council (2-PAC) meetings take place on the second Monday of each month at Monroe Village, 1900 Central Avenue, from 6 to 8 p.m. This across the street from the 2nd Precinct Police Station. There is free, off-street parking behind the building and street parking along Central Avenue.

The 2-PAC meetings are open to the public. We gather at 6 and the meeting starts at 6:15. The agenda includes introductions, a speaker, announcements, routine business, and the Court watch program where we follow 20 Eastside offenders through the court system.

2-PAC has a new parole officer! Welcome Holly Ihrke, Hennepin County Probation Officer assigned to the 2nd Precinct.

Theft From Motor Vehicle Is A Crime Of Opportunity

While in the gym, going for a jog, at work or just stopping for dinner – safely store work and/or personal electronics, (especially laptop computers and briefcases) and other personal belongings (purse, wallet, and jewelry).

PUT YOUR JUNK IN YOUR TRUNK before you arrive at your destination.

Please, do not leave any of these items in the passenger compartment of your vehicle...EVER

Do not think you are fooling anyone by tucking your belongings under a seat, blanket, or a coat

Do not leave valuables in the glove box or center storage. TAKE YOUR KEY FOB WITH YOU.

It takes a thief just a few seconds to break a window or manipulate a lock to steal your valuables.

Even if YOU do not think it is worth much (loose change or a shopping bag) a thief sees an opportunity.

Is it worth a broken window, damage to your vehicle or the insurance hassle?

Remove the temptation and reduce the opportunity

DO NOT leave ANY items in your vehicle

Lock your doors; even in a secured parking garage - know where your key/FOB is at all times

Never leave your vehicle "warming up" with the keys in the ignition - it $\underline{\mathsf{IS}}$ illegal; thieves will view a running car as a personal invitation

Park in well lit, well traveled areas

Keep an electronics inventory list with serial numbers in a safe location (not stored in any electronic devices). Your smart phone has its own fingerprint called an IMEI. Locate the IMEI in your "settings" Snap a picture of it, then send it to your email; keep a copy of the screen photo with your inventory list. Recovered items will not be returned to you without proper documentation and a corresponding police report.

FILE A POLICE REPORT - Call 911 if the thief has left behind evidence or call 311 or go to http://www.ci.minneapolis.mn.us/police/index.htm to file a theft report






